

ISLAND CAMP FAQ

INTERMEDIATE ISLAND: COMPLETED GRADES 4-6

JR HIGH ISLAND: COMPLETED GRADES 6-9

HOW DO CAMPERS GET TO AND FROM THE ISLAND?

After Sunday evening check-in, campers travel by boat to the island and remain there for the full camp session with their group, typically alongside 30–45 other campers. Campers return to the mainland on Friday morning for pick-up. There are no routine trips back and forth during the week, so campers should plan to stay on the island for the full session.

WHAT MAKES ISLAND CAMP UNIQUE?

Island Camp is a rustic, outdoor-focused experience. Cabins do not have electricity, though the main lodge does have power when needed. Restroom facilities are outhouses, and many meals are prepared over an open fire. Because campers spend much of the day outdoors, clothing and gear will likely get dirty. Activities vary by group and weather, but often include swimming, paddleboarding, fire cooking, large-group games, and wilderness skills such as shelter building and other outdoor survival basics. The schedule follows a general daily rhythm while allowing flexibility for the group's pace and interests.

HOW ARE SAFETY MEASURES HANDLED?

Island Directors oversee camper medications and daily health needs throughout the week. In the event of severe weather, campers are moved to the main lodge, the island's primary shelter. If emergency assistance is needed, camp leadership coordinates with the Morrison County Sheriff's Office and other local responders as appropriate. Because campers remain on the island for the full week, parents should pack with the expectation of outdoor living and changing weather.
